Pastor's Message

Everywhere I look around our church, I see talent. I see talent in the people, in the gifts that you share for the entire congregation to experience and enjoy; I see talent in the musicians who sing and play multiple instruments and new music for all of us to embrace; I see the talent to take some "oops" paint and transform the Sunday School classrooms into biblical tableaux. Our children no longer "go to the nursery, the toddler room, the fifth grade classroom"; they go to "The Ark," and "The Garden," and "The Lion's Den" to learn and grow, sing and pray, and to be surrounded by God's story.

There are talents that are not so visible, yet so very important in the life of the church. We have leadership that devotes a lot of heartfelt, prayerful time for decision making and direction setting for our church. Attend any committee meeting and you will see the dedication of the folks you have elected to serve as your leaders.

There are trustees who care for the building have a never-ending list of property and maintenance decisions to make and execute, as you can imagine when dealing with a building the size, structure and age of ours. There are trustees who manage our endowments and trust funds with integrity and generosity to the church. We have church officers—Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, Financial Secretary and Assistant Financial Secretary who work so hard on our behalf practically on a daily basis.

The women in the Thrift Shop serve God in multiple ways. Their generosity to the needy of the community and the needs of our church is phenomenal. They live out the gifts of the Spirit with amazing grace.

And teachers. We have so many: ones who are new to the ministry and ones that have stepped up year after year to work with children, teens and adults in sharing the good news of God's love with all of us. Keen attention is paid to our children and the youth groups have the stability of leaders who are committed to helping our young people become disciples, even as they are growing themselves. We have an adult study group that is growing and reaching more and more folks. They have explored topics from The Purpose-Driven Life to Prayer to the Foundations of our faith.

Talent abounds! The staff behind the scenes has worked together for 12 years plus. When a church has that kind of longevity in its staff, it says something very good about the relationship between the congregation and its administrative team.

What makes this life so good? Behind every talent that is shared for the benefit of our church is a deeper gift, and that gift is *love*. I cannot say it any better than Paul did in his letter to the Corinthians, and so I leave you with his words. Think on these things this month as you consider your talents and find ways to share them with the church family.

"If I speak in the tongues of mortals and of angels and have not love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. And if I have prophetic powers, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so as to move mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. If I give away all my possessions, and if I hand over my body so that I may boast, but do not have love, I gain nothing.

Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.

Love never ends. But as for prophecies, they will come to an end; and as for tongues, they will cease; as for knowledge, it will come to an end. For we know only in part, and we prophesy only in part; but when the complete comes, the partial will come to an end. When I was a child, I spoke like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child; when I became an adult, I put an end to childish ways. For now we see in a mirror, dimly, but then we will see face to face. Now I know only in part; then I will know fully even as I have been fully known. And now faith, hope, and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love." 1 Corinthians 13:1-13

EXPLORING MEMBERSHIP

A Call to ALL Members and Friends of FPFC

On October 7, our congregation enters a new phase in its growth and development as a 21st century church. On that day, we set out on a newly defined, home-spun spiritual adventure aptly called "Exploring Membership." (Our thanks to Dave Stansfield for the title!) This program is brought to you by the Board of Deacons.

All members and friends of FPFC are encouraged to make "Exploring Membership" a priority. This four-session seminar prepares folks to enter into membership in FPFC for Membership Sunday on December 20.

For folks who are already "on the rolls," chances are you have never heard of most of the facts and ideas, nor perhaps wrestled with the faith questions and challenges to be posed and explored in this program. All will find the content interesting and edifying and the fellowship fun and enlivening.

Membership matters. In an age and among new generations who tend not to give high priority to membership in institutions, the church is one "organization" where the benefits of membership are exceptionally purposeful and life inspiring. So, what are these benefits?

- One is identified as a believer (or a believer in process, as I am prone to saying). *See Ephesians 2:19; Romans 12:5*
- One is provided with a spiritual family to support and encourage one in their faith walk. *See Galatians 6:1-2; Hebrews 10:24-25*
- One is given a place to discover and use their gifts in ministry. *See I Corinthians 12:4-27*
- One is placed under the spiritual protection of godly leaders. *See Hebrews 13:17; Acts 20:28-29*
- Life in community gives one the accountability one needs to grow in faith toward spiritual maturity. *See Ephesians 5:21*

Membership (with regular participation, of course!) in a church provides opportunities and benefits that cannot be found anywhere else on earth. According to Rick Warren in *The Purpose Driven Church*:

- *Worship helps you focus on God. It prepares you spiritually and emotionally for the week ahead.*
- *Fellowship helps you face life's problems by providing the support and encouragement of other Christians.*
- *Discipleship helps you fortify your faith by learning the truth of God's Word and applying biblical principles to your lifestyle.*
- *Ministry helps you find and develop your talents and use them in serving others.*
- *Evangelism helps you fulfill your mission of reaching your friends and family for their own faith development and relationships with God and Jesus Christ.*

Imagine Another World is possible 2009 Neighbors in Need ~ Justice and Witness Ministries "The Moral Outrage of Poverty"

Taking a stand against injustice, New York City's Poverty Initiative is a program "dedicated to raising up generations of religious and community leaders committed to building a movement to end poverty."

A key element of this program is that it's led by the poor. Program coordinator Dawn Plummer says, "we seek to train and network grassroots antipoverty, church and community leaders to re-ignite the 'Poor People's Campaign' and finish the unfinished business of Rev Dr Martin Luther King, Jr." Last year, Poverty Initiative commemorated the 40th anniversary of Dr King's, "Poor People's Campaign" by sponsoring numerous educational and public events.

Given the unfolding economic crisis, Ms Plummer knows that "training and opportunities to join poor people's organizations and struggles together are needed now more than ever." Moreover, Ms Plummer believes that "new victims of poverty will increasingly turn to those positioned at the community level to best meet their immediate needs, point to the moral outrage of poverty, and demand its end." During 2008 - 2009, Poverty Initiative Scholars Program will train over 150 people from more than 35 low-income communities. The training sessions will take place in New York City and Charleston, West Virginia.

The signature event of Poverty Initiative is the Poverty Truth Commissions, inspired by the Truth Commissions held in South Africa and elsewhere.

As a 2008 Neighbors in Need grant recipient, Poverty Initiative is determined to "finish the unfinished business of Rev Dr King" to eradicate poverty. Your gifts to the UCC's Neighbors in Need offering go a long way toward reaching Poverty Initiative's goals.
